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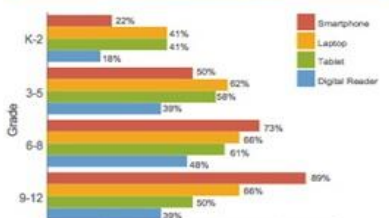

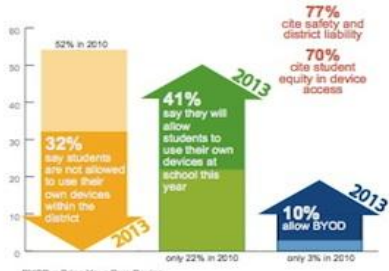

## School Provided Tablets or Laptops



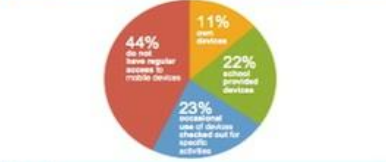

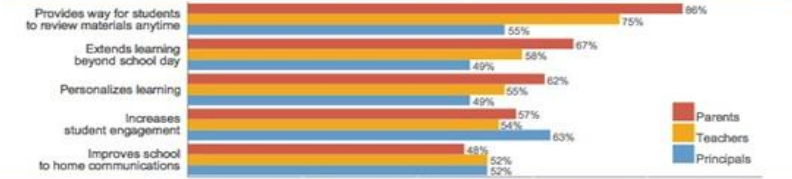
## Student Mobile Device Usage for School Work
