Alignment and Authentic Assessment

“What can students do, after taking your course, that they couldn’t do before?”

“What must students be able to do before accomplishing the course objectives?”

“Your student is going to work at an entry-level job in the area of this course. What is he/she going to do at work? What earns him/her a paycheck?”

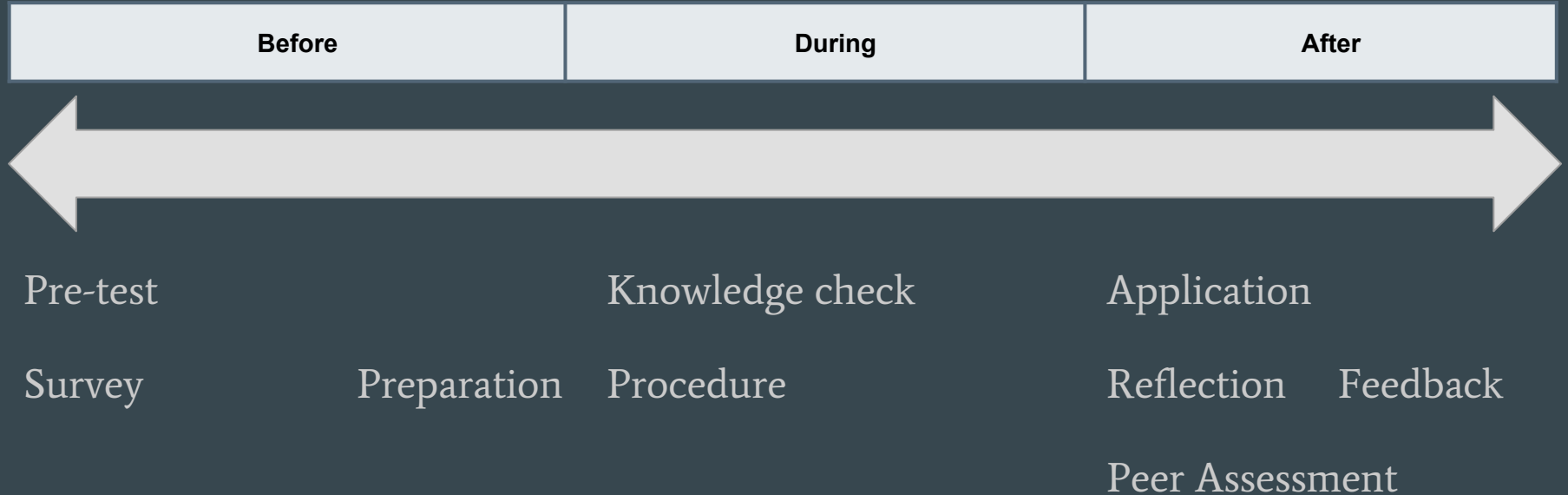

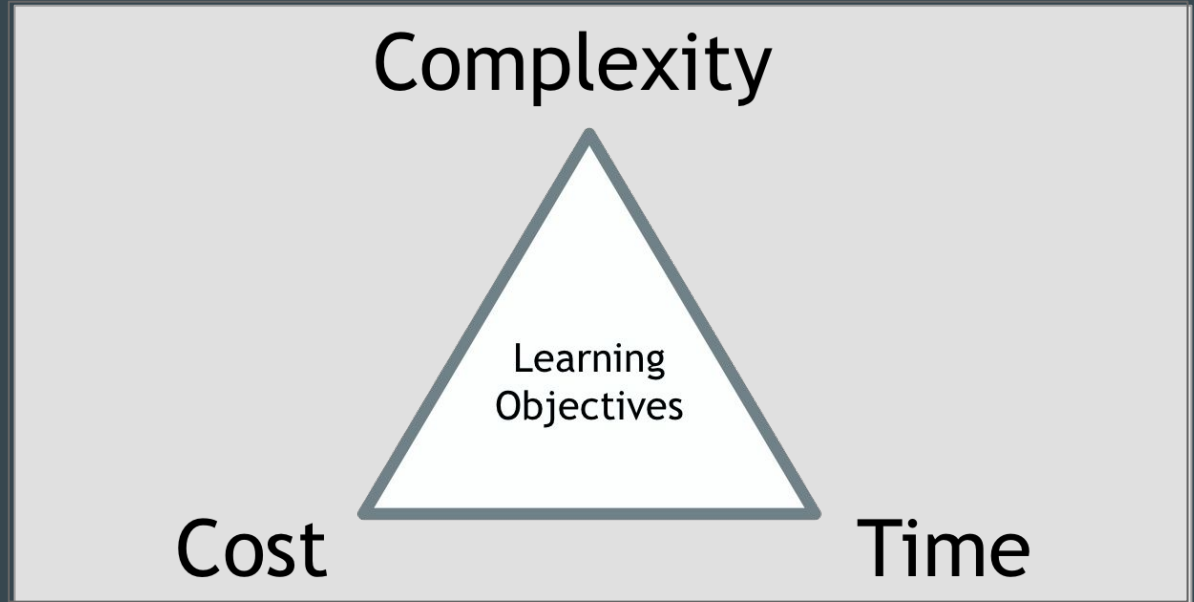

Fit: Why this Assessment?

- Objectives (Alignment)
- Key competencies
- Constraints
 - Time
 - Budget
 - Resources
- Workload / facilitation
- Maximize impact and measurement within constraints

Mastery

Students may practice to mastery and build confidence through informal ungraded assessments. Examples include:

- Low stakes quizzes make connections between readings and content
- Quizzes assess general comprehension of key concepts
- Random pools allow meaningful practice
- Flashcards allow repeatable, random practice
- Games add elements of time and challenge, with motivation to “level up”

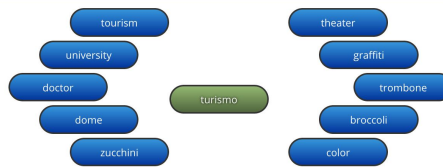

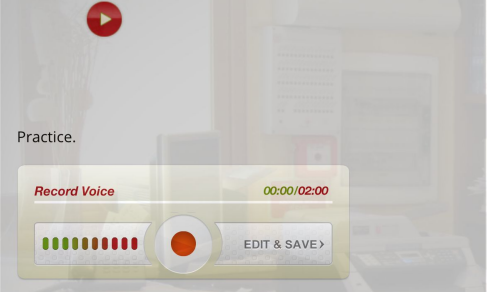

The basic question you should always ask yourself about every statement is: Is this in S-V-O order or O-V-S order?

Remember the German "verb in second position" rule from [section 9](#) of our textbook. That law always makes the job of figuring out the basic sentence structure much easier, because you know that all the words to the left of the verb are **one unit of meaning** (not more than one).

Tip: nominative = subject | accusative = object

Authentic Simulations

- Authentic simulations measure skills, knowledge, situational performance and decision-making ability (sometimes under stress).
- They sometimes allow role play to experience different points of view.
- Follow up with reflection and debrief to assess the experience.
- Simulation doesn't need to be expensive!

Collective Bargaining 7-Week Group Simulation

Traditional Collaborative Paper →

Authentic Group Role Play

- You work at a large company in Indianapolis
- You represent the company or labor
- Present offers, make replies to reach a new contract
- Emotional investment
- Low budget, high impact

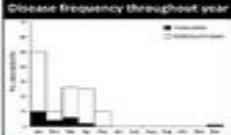

 - Italian Language:
Paired role-play to measure spontaneous speaking and listening skills
 - Conflict Resolution:
Simulated mediation to measure communication and persuasion skills
 - Teacher Leadership Inquiry:
Research and presentation to measure communication with stakeholders and ability to connect data to an action plan
 - Organization Change and Development:
Analyze cases or conduct interviews with professionals to measure ability to make data-driven recommendations and see potential pitfalls
